Dear Students and Parents/Guardians.

I hope each of you are enjoying a restful and meaningful time with your family during the Christmas Recess. Before school resumes, here are some general reminders along with additional information to review. I wish you a Happy New Year!

DAILY COVID-19 CHECKLIST

I would like to thank all parents & students for your diligence in filling out the daily COVID Checklist. This must be filled out online everyday, for each student that will be on campus. Our staff members also complete the screening each day before entering the building. Please complete the form prior to your student getting on the bus or arriving at school each morning.

REVIEW OF PREVENTIVE SAFETY MEASURES

Students are required to complete an at-home wellness check survey each morning prior to leaving for school.

Visitors will be restricted to ensure that exposure risks are minimized

Face masks must be worn by all individuals on campus in settings where social distancing measures are difficult to maintain. When in the classroom students may be given mask breaks at the discretion of the teacher. If a student is directed to put on their mask, they are expected to do so. Students who fail to adhere to these expectations will not be permitted in the building. Hygiene guidelines: Handwashing, sanitizer stations and frequent cleaning of campus spaces are critical components of school remaining open.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Students are not permitted to enter the building until 7:30 AM. Students arriving at that time must report to Cafeteria B. Students being dropped off must be dropped off in the Zipp Parking lot and enter door L.

Parents picking up their child at the end of the school day must pick them up in the Zipp gym parking lot near door L.

PE lockers will not be assigned, therefore students will not be changing for PE. Students should wear clothes appropriate for physical activity on days they have PE. Sneakers are required as well.

CODE OF CONDUCT/ACCEPTABLE USE POLICY

Please take time to review the Student Handbook and Code of Conduct (please click link to review) which can be found in the 2020-2021 WCS District Calendar that you received in the mail prior to the start of the school year. Additionally, it is important that students review the Acceptable Use Policy (please click link to review) as it will apply whether you are on or off campus. Students are expected to behave in a respectful and responsible manner at all times. However, if problems occur, students must report the incident to a staff member in order for the problem to be addressed.

JANUARY CALENDAR CHANGE

Please mark your calendars - January 29, 2021 was originally scheduled as a Superintendent's day at the MS/HS. Due to the cancellation of January Regents exams January 29, 2021 is a day of instruction. Cohort B students are to report to school. Cohort A and D students are to attend remotely.

CHROMEBOOKS

School issued Chromebooks must be brought to school fully charged every day. All students are required to complete their school work using their school issued Chromebook, even if working remotely from home.

HEALTH

We are looking forward to continued health and wellness at school. As winter is upon us and students inevitably get colds, etc., we are hopeful that our mask wearing and frequent hand washing and sanitizing will minimize our cold season. 2nd QUARTER

The 2nd quarter ends Friday, January 22 - (15 school days as of January 4th). 2nd Quarter Report Cards will be mailed on Friday, February 5th. There are plenty of opportunities to bring up unsatisfactory grades during the 2nd quarter and beyond. Our dedicated teachers are here to help all our students. Please encourage your student to contact their teacher(s) for help if they are struggling. If you have any questions or concerns, do not hesitate to contact your child's teachers, guidance counselor or Principal Benton.

REMOTE LEARNING

It is extremely important that students attend all of their classes when remote learning, as well as attending school on their scheduled in-person days. A parent/guardian should contact the Attendance Office if their child is unable to attend in-person on the day(s) they are scheduled to do so. Students should not be self selecting when they are remote. Class includes instruction and activities with teachers as well as assigned learning that students complete on their own. Students should have their cameras on for the entire remote class unless the teacher or teacher aide has given them permission to turn it off. When cameras are on this helps your child's teacher know if your child is engaged in learning and understanding what is being taught. It is expected that parents shall, to the maximum extent possible, ensure that their child participates in remote learning.

ATTENDANCE

Your child needs to log into their google classroom for homeroom every morning, in order to be marked present for the day. Students in Cohort A and Cohort B are expected to be here in person on their assigned days. If your child will not be in school on a day they should be, please contact the attendance office.

Wednesdays: Your child also needs to complete and submit all of his/her assignments by the deadline given by the teacher. This will ensure that your child is marked present for that class period. If they fail to do so, they will be marked absent.

It is extremely important that your child signs in to all of their classes on days that they are remote, not only Wednesday, but all remote days.

Tips: Here are some helpful tips to help make Wednesday remote instruction easier for all: Log in as if it were any other remote day for homeroom and work through your schedule. Use your agenda to write down assignments.

Contact your teachers if you have questions or require assistance.

EXTRA HELP

Teachers are available for extra help on Monday - Thursday during 12th period. If your child requires extra help and is not physically present in school on one of those days, please have your child contact their teacher to make arrangements to receive help via email or Google Meet.

Performing Concerts in 2020... Where there's a will, there's a way!

Hats off to the students and teachers in the Performing Arts Department. They have certainly proven that "where there is a will, there is a way". Through some incredible teamwork, collaboration and hours of hard work, the department was able to produce both instrumental and choral concerts for the holidays.

For the Middle School Band concert. Mr. Adam Brignone used a program called SmartMusic, which allowed his students to record their performances in the same format, on the music, as their fellow bandmates. Students did most of their recordings at home, but some percussionists needed to record in school, using equipment they did not own. Students rehearsed for almost 3 months, and then submitted their recordings by December 1st. From there, Mr. Brignone downloaded all the individual recordings (between 90-100) and used a program named GarageBand to combine them. It took over 60 hours for him to record students, listen to submissions, line up all of the recordings, edit them, and adjust the differing volumes for proper balance. After the songs were pieced together and fine-tuned, Mr. Brignone exported them to iTunes, and completed the full band concert using iMovie.

Mr. Brignone and Mrs. Andres offer special thanks to Technology Coordinator *Mrs. Bonnie Simpson* and

Middle School Principal *Mr. Scott Benton* for their assistance. Mrs. Simpson helped upload all of the concerts to YouTube and the district website, while Mr. Benton allowed for extra time and flexibility, which meant that the teachers and their students could complete the concerts in time for Christmas break.

Mrs. Claudia Andres taught herself all sorts of new technology and techniques, in order to produce the December choral concert. During on-site rehearsals, students stood 12 feet apart, singing lightly with a mask on. To create a full concert, students practiced independently and then recorded themselves, singing to an accompaniment track using headphones, so that only their voices came through. Mrs. Andres also used the SmartMusic software for some recordings. Other segments were made by recording an accompaniment track on one device, while singing into another. After students shared their individual recordings with her, Mrs. Andres used a program called Audacity to piece them all together. She estimates that it took her well over 40-50 hours to line up all the individual clips and balance the sound to produce fully realized songs. On some pieces she had to organize up to fifty individual voices. Mrs. Andres wishes to thank Ms. Mahar for her help.
