“LET’S NOT FORGET”

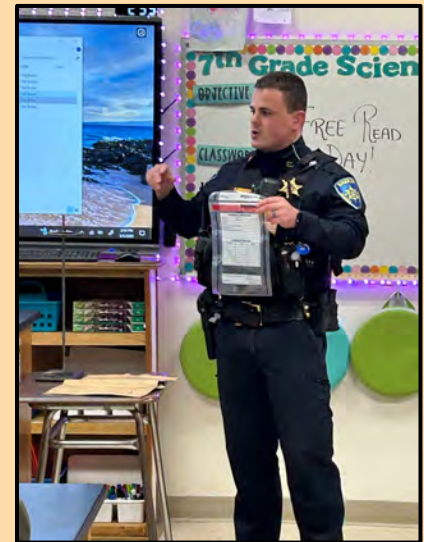

Students learned that the bluebird is the official bird of New York State, and that a nesting pair of birds will have multiple hatches of babies each year with ideal conditions. 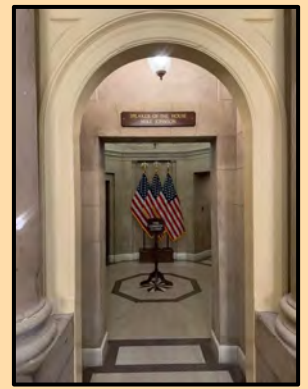
2025 8th GRADE

GETTYSBURG/WASHINGTON, DC TRIP

On April 30th, many of our 8th grade students had an experience of a lifetime traveling to Gettysburg, PA on the first of their three day excursion. After a full day visiting historic Gettysburg, exploring the Civil War Battlefield site and a private tour of the grounds, students went to their final destination near Washington, DC.

Next, students and chaperones had a packed filled day and evening with their guide in Washington DC touring many sites including; The White House, The Capitol, The Supreme Court, U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, Jefferson Memorial, Lincoln Memorial, Vietnam Memorial, World War II Memorial, Korean Memorial, FDR Memorial, MLK Jr. Memorial and more. Students and chaperones walked over 10 miles taking in every moment possible of our historic United States capital.

On our final day, we visited Arlington Cemetery where we watched the changing of the guards, toured the Arlington House/Robert E. Lee Memorial and cemetery grounds. We continued our trip by visiting the Marine Corps/Iwo Jima Memorial and The National 9/11 Pentagon Memorial. 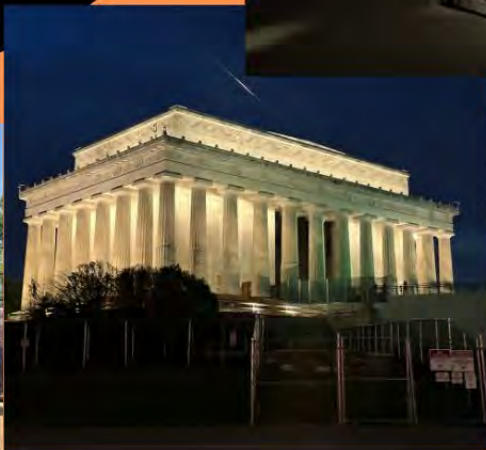

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS CREATE THE FIRST **‘LEGENDS AND LORE’ HISTORICAL MARKER** **IN NIAGARA COUNTY!**

Since 2012, seventh and eighth grade students in Wilson Middle School have become keenly aware of the blue and gold historical markers throughout their community. As part of their Social Studies classes, students are required to photograph themselves next to markers and log their visits to historic places using their passports. The practice began when Social Studies teachers Brett Sippel and Jim Alderman collaborated with librarian Maureen Mahar, to build more emphasis on local history into their curriculum. The goal of the unit is for students to gain increased awareness of locally significant people and places, and learn more information about important locations and historical events that have taken place in Niagara and Erie Counties.

This year, a group of six students collaborated on the creation of a new historical marker to install in the community. Eighth graders Teddy Andrews, Ethan Dietz, Jamison Geier, Calvin Lawson, Brynn Lepsch and Lilianna Woodward worked with Mr. Sippel to research a little - known story from the 1800s, about Luther Wilson and his efforts to save a herd of cows from invading British soldiers. (Luther was the son of Reuben Wilson, the founder of Wilson.)

The students began their research in seventh grade, consulting materials found in the school library including books, old newsletters and publications from the Wilson Historical Society and a 2014 article from the Buffalo News written by Teresa Sharp. Ms. Sharp's article featured local artist George Banagis, whose drawing of Luther rescuing the cows was featured on a postcard published by the Niagara Falls National Heritage Area. The students also met with the former president of the Wilson Historical Society, Charles Horton, who shared a treasure trove of resources with them.

After completing their research, students applied for a grant from the William G. Pomeroy Foundation. Since Mr. Sippel had helped a previous student secure a different marker in 2019, he was familiar with the process and was able to guide the group through the steps. The final inscription that appears on the marker was written by the students as a group, and adjusted only slightly by the Pomeroy Foundation. As an added bonus to this project, all participating students will receive one point towards their Seal of Civic Readiness. Recently, NYS Education made changes to its graduation pathway requirements, allowing service learning projects as a means to earn credits towards graduation. Students had to meet several different criteria to have their marker process qualify as a Capstone Project. The students made a presentation on May 28th to a panel of educators including Mrs. Tiffany-West, Mrs. Seeley, Mr. Benton and Mr. Alderman. Any students who earn 6 points by the time they graduate will earn a Seal of Civic Readiness.

Mr. Sippel is very proud of the students for taking on this project, and creating a lasting tribute that local members of the community and visitors from all around the world may enjoy for decades to come. The marker is located next to the pavilion near Calvin E Krueger Park (the little league fields), 350 Ontario St, in the village of Wilson. As confirmed by the Pomeroy Foundation, this is the first Legends and Lore marker installed in Niagara County. Instead of the familiar blue and gold colors, this marker has a beautiful red background and includes a distinct moon logo that all Legend markers have.
