

MLA Style Guide – Wilson Middle/High School

PRINT SOURCES

1. Book – no author

Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary. Springfield: Mirriam Webster, 1987.

2. Book – with editor

Editor, ed. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: Smith, William, ed. Arms Control. New York: H.W. Wilson Company, 1965.

3. Book – one author

Author. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: Bernstein, Theodore. The Careful Writer. New York: Atheneum, 1965.

4. Book – two or more authors

Authors. Title of Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: Jacobson, Joseph and Linda Evans. Shape of Language. Bloomington: Indiana University Press, 1979.

5. Magazine Article

Author. "Title of Article." Name of Magazine. Date of Magazine: page(s).

Example: Stone, Judith. "Moonlighting." Discover. 28 Oct. 1987: 93-95.

6. Newspaper Article

Author. "Title of Article." Name of Newspaper Date, Edition (if given): page(s).

Example: Pareles, Jon. "New Age Music Booms Softly." New York Times 29 Nov. 1987, Early ed.: 3A.

7. Encyclopedia Article – *signed by author*

Author of Article. "Title of Article." Name of Encyclopedia. Copyright.

Example: Burke, Phillip. "Treaty of Versailles." Encyclopedia Americana. 1985.

8. Encyclopedia Article – *unsigned (no author)*

"Title of Article." Name of Encyclopedia. Copyright.

Example: "Versailles." Encyclopedia Americana. 1985.

9. SIRS Article – from binder

Author. "Title of Article." Original magazine Date: page(s). Title of SIRS volume. SIRS editor, ed. SIRS volume#. City of publication: Publisher, Copyright. Article #.

Example: Gilman, Robert. "Simple Answers." In Context Spring 1992: 10-13. Population. Eleanor Goldstein, ed. Vol. 2. Boca Raton: SIRS, 1993. Art. 44.

10. Government Publication

Government Agency issuing the document. Title of Publication. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: U.S. Department of State. Bureau of Public Affairs. Nation Notes - Angola. Washington: GPO, 1987.

11. Opposing Viewpoints Pamphlets

Author. Title of Original Book. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright. Opposing Viewpoints Title. Opposing Viewpoints Editor, ed. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright. Page(s).

Example: Luker, Kristen. Abortion and the Politics of Motherhood. Berkley: University of California Press, 1984.
Opposing Viewpoints: Should Abortion Remain Legal? David L. Bender, ed. San Diego: Greenhaven Press, 1980. 147-150.

NON-PRINT SOURCES

12. SIRS Knowledge Source – Online Database

Author. "Title of Article." Original Source of Article. Date of Original Source: Page(s). Database Name. School name, City, State. Date Accessed. <<http://sks.sirs.com>>.

Example: Frick, Bob. "Investing in Medical Miracles." Kiplinger's Personal Finance Feb 2000: 80-87. SIRS Knowledge Source. WCS. Wilson, NY. 19 Nov. 2007. <<http://sks.sirs.com>>.

13. Newsbank Infoweb - Newspaper Article

Author. "Article Title." Newspaper Title Date, edition, section (if available): Page. Database Name. School name, City, State. Date Accessed. <<http://infoweb.newsbank.com>>.

Example: Peres, Judy. "Couple's Divorce Entangles Frozen Embryos." Chicago Tribune 7 Aug. 1999, Morning ed., News sec.: 1. NewsBank NewsFile Collection. WCS, Wilson, NY. 16 Aug. 1999. <<http://infoweb.newsbank.com>>.

14. ProQuest Magazine Article

Author. "Article Title." Name of Magazine Date: Page. Database Name. School name, City, State. Date Accessed. <<http://www.proquest.com>>.

Example: Page, Robert. "Duke Will Play the Game." Variety 29 Jan. 2007: 62. ProQuest. WCS, Wilson, NY. 15 Nov. 2007. <<http://www.proquest.com>>.

15. Encyclopedia Article- from CD-ROM

"Title of Article." Title of CD-ROM. Edition. CD-ROM. City of Publication: Publisher, Copyright.

Example: "Industrial Revolution." Grolier Encyclopedia. 1996 ed. CD-ROM. Danbury: Grolier, 1996.

16. Internet

Author (if provided). Title of Website. Date of Website. Date Accessed <URL address>.

Example: Yule, James. The Cold War. Nov. 1999. 20 May 2007 <<http://usa.coldwar.server.gov/cold.war>>.

17. Personal Interview

Name of the person being interviewed. Personal interview. Date of interview.

Example: Jufer, Charles. Personal interview. 2 Jan. 2007.

Additional Notes:

*Citations are arranged **alphabetically** in a bibliography, on a separate sheet. *When alphabetizing an entry that begins with a title, IGNORE A, An or The. (Example: The Newly Revised Dictionary will be alphabetized under 'N'.)*

*List author's last name first, **EXCEPT** in the case of two or more authors. In that case, the first author is last name first, while the added authors are first name first. (*Ex: Jufer, Charles and Joe Smith*)

*Abbreviate all months except May, June and July. For a newspaper or weekly magazine, list day before month. (*Ex: 28 Oct. 1998*)

*Reverse indent for two or more lines. Example follows:

*Jacobson, Joseph and Stephanie Evangelista. The Secret Shape of Language. Bloomington:
Indiana University Press, 1979.*
