



Updates

<u>Shared Decision Making Team</u>- At this months Shared decision making team meeting, we reviewed the results of the professional development survey that was sent around. The survey was taken by 111 people in the district. The top three professional development topics were in order of highest priority school safety and security, curriculum alignment and technology integration topics. We will focus on those three items for next year.

Capital Project Update- The Capital Project is well underway. The clinic at the elementary school has been taken apart and it is expected that next week they will start putting it back together and finish remodeling it. The site work has begun in full swing. The drainage for the new turf athletic field is almost complete. Work will continue all summer with an early fall completion goal. The guidance suite at the high school will be renovated this summer beginning in July. Also, the high school main office will go through renovations this summer.





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<u>Capital Outlay Project 2019-2020</u>- Our final plans have been submitted to NYSED for next year's capital outlay project. We are going to create a secure entry at the Middle School. In the big Capital Project, the Elementary School is getting a secure entrance. So with next year's project we are doing the Middle School. A secure entrance allows visitors into a vestibule without having access to the rest of the building. Along with the secure entrance, we are continuing to replace the hallway flooring in the Middle School.
