Updates

Capital Project Update-

- The phone system and mass notification system at the elementary school are operational. At the HS/MS the wiring is continuing. the goal is on December 23rd, to have the phones in and connected. I am told the HS/MS will have phones after the break.
- Windows at the HS are almost complete. Final painting and touch up will be this week weather permitting. We will also have final window adjustment this week. The blinds are ordered and we are expecting them in the coming weeks.
- New window glass and glazing for two upstairs art rooms at the HS was completed.
- At a recent Capital Project meeting, we reviewed the incidental budget and have determined we have a bit of money still available. We discussed options and made the decision that we would do a pull out project and have the HS front entrance created into a secure vestibule. This was a priority for the District. LaBella, our architects, were given the go ahead to get a cost proposal and a drawing of what it would look like. When complete, the plans will go to the Board for review. If all goes well, the new front secure vestibule will go in this coming summer.






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• With the warm weather last week, track striping was completed. The track looks great.





<u>Capital Outlay Project 2019-2020</u>- The COP 2019-2020 secure vestibule at the MS had to go out for a rebid. The reason was that the first bid was too high. To cut some cost, we did some of the work under the current capital project and we are going to put the windows and secure doors under the COP. By the end of this school year, the MS will have a secure vestibule similar to the Elementary School.
