

Dear Wilson Middle School Students, Parents, and Staff,

As expectations for improved instruction and assessment are set for our teachers, the expectations for our students remain high. Students must be present, on time, focused, prepared with required assignments and materials, and participate in the teaching in the classroom so that they can perform on quizzes, tests and assessments. There are many things that students are preoccupied with when completing homework. My hope is that students have a quiet place to complete homework without being preoccupied with cell phones and other social media or activity that pulls their attention from their homework. Encourage children to focus on their learning and stress the importance of school attendance and arrival to school and class on time. These are two behaviors that relate to the world of work and they need to be mastered by our young people so that they will be successful at the next grade level and eventually the world of college or work.

Teachers assign homework that is meaningful and its purpose is to review the material that was taught in class. Every assignment must be entirely completed with quality and turned in on time in order to receive credit. Students that do not complete homework consistently will struggle academically. However, students that complete every homework assignment to the best of their ability will do very well academically, even if they do not perform well on quizzes and tests. The bottom line is this: If students believe homework is important, they will complete the homework to the best of their ability and again, perform well academically.

The overall success of this school year will continue and requires each of us to continue working together, listening to one another's concerns and doing our part to contribute to a positive, healthy and safe school experience.



WRITING LIKE THE SUMERIANS

February 10th was not your typical day in 6th grade Social Studies. Students learned about the earliest known system of writing called cuneiform. This system of writing was very different than the way we write today. Around 3000 B.C., this system of writing was being developed. At first, this writing was mostly made up of pictographs, yet over time it transformed to symbols that represented sounds. The scribes or professional writers, went to school for over 10 years to master over 800 symbols used in cuneiform. The symbols were written on a wet clay tablet with a tool called a stylus. Then the clay was left to dry. Most likely the first writings were of business transactions to keep records for the kings and priests. Eventually stories, poems and letters were written in cuneiform for others to enjoy.

Although the 6th graders had fun writing in cuneiform, they realized how difficult it was to write on clay and to make the different symbols using a stylus. Even the thought of carrying around the clay tablets brought on a discussion about how heavy they must have been and cumbersome to carry from place to place. In the end, students decided that they like our traditional alphabet and how we are able to write on paper or even type on a computer instead of writing like a Sumerian!



















CHAIRity FUNDRAISER

On January 31st, Mr. Baker and his art students hosted a CHAIRity Silent Auction in the Library Media Center. Over forty one-of-a-kind, hand painted chairs were available for bidding. Each chair followed a theme that was developed by the students. The process began with rough sketches which became fully realized designs, painted with acrylic paint. The night raised \$2,000 and after the money was collected, students discussed possible recipients for donations. 
