KINDNESS PROGRAM

The idea to start a Kindness Program was born last spring. Students and staff were all feeling the pressures of living life during a pandemic, and also dealing with the fear and anger of senseless gun violence in Uvalde, Texas and Buffalo, New York. With a renewed emphasis on mental health, twenty staff members in the middle school decided to team up and make kindness a priority this year. Their first idea was to design a tee shirt inspired by the 'Choose Love' shirts worn by the Buffalo Bills. Thanks to donations from the following organizations, over 300 shirts were purchased for every staff member and student in the Middle School, at no cost to them:

- MS/HS PTSA
- Shared Decision Making Committee
- MS Student Council

About once a month, 'Kindness Days' will be scheduled, with activities happening at each grade level, centering on kindness. Additionally, Kindness Coins are distributed each week to deserving students in grades 6-8. The coins may







be redeemed in the cafeteria for 50 cents. Teachers and staff members may also give out Kindness slips, recognizing students for random acts of kindness. During the Kindness Day in September, **Mrs. Reagan** read the book *One Kindness* by Jacqueline Woodson in her sixth grade classes. Students also created bookmarks that were donated to Wilson Elementary and the public library. Eighth graders in **Mr. Alderman's** classes worked in groups to create kindness-themed posters, that were hung around outside his room. Some classroom activities and gestures that have been offered include:

- wearing Kindness shirts in a show of togetherness
- painting kindness rocks
- writing Thank You notes to veterans
- making yummy treats to share with classmates
- creating kindness posters for display in the hallways
- watching videos that feature random acts of kindness
- studying true, significant acts of kindness throughout world history
- receiving free goodies from the lunch room (thanks Mrs. Bell)
- reading books and short stories centering on kindness
- receiving tokens and appreciation slips for random acts of kindness
- making bookmarks to donate to the public library and WES
- creating weekly announcements centered on kindness
- writing Teacher Appreciation cards
- singing songs about love & peace in music class



money for the 25 Book Club program!






















7th GRADE FIELD TRIP TO FORT NIAGARA






The seventh grade field trip to Fort Niagara has become a favorite each fall. Students were guided around the grounds and learned what life was like for early settlers. Living history interpreters showed students how to cook over an open flame, fire cannons and survive with limited resources. Thank you to **Mr. Sippel** for organizing the trip, and to the chaperones who spent a great day with students exploring this historic fort.









MOCK ELECTION

Each year, **Mr. Sippel** offers his 7th graders a lesson about the electoral college. He holds a mock-election to illustrate the difference between the popular vote and electoral votes. Two presidential

candidates present their platforms to each class of voters, who are split up into states. This year, Mr. Sippel and **Miss Mahar** were the candidates. Each candidate presents a platform of opposing issues, followed by a question and answer session. Platform issues are geared to be schoolspecific, and this year's issues included: a cell phone policy; dress code; legal driving age; school lunch menu; homework; length of school day and length of school year. Candidates hold opposing views on each issue, so students use a chart to weigh the pros and cons, before casting their vote. Since there are very few times when a student agrees with 100% of a candidate's platform, s/he must make an informed decision, based on what issues s/he believes to be most important. After votes are cast, Mr. Sippel displays a chart and records both the popular vote and the electoral vote. He uses a

modified list of states (less than 50), with each classroom having states that range in the number of electoral college votes they have. Since states like New York and Florida have more Electoral College votes (29 each) than states like Vermont and Alaska (3 each), students are able to see how certain states influence the outcome of an election more than others. In the week leading up to the election, signs are put up in the hallways and each candidate filmed campaign commercials for students to view. Mr. Sippel and Miss Mahar have been teaching the lesson for a long time and this year, the popular vote was tied going into the last class period of the day! Mr. Sippel and Miss Mahar believe it is a fun, informative

way for students to learn about elections and the electoral college.


PATHWAYS PROGRAM

Harvey and Mrs. Janelle Harvey, for replenishing the flowers. We are all looking forward to seeing them bloom in next spring!








