




MIDDLE SCHOOL SCIENCE CLUB

The Middle School Science Club has had lots of fun this fall. Earlier this month the students had the opportunity to participate in the "A Day in the Life" field trip thanks to the Sea Grant Project. Students were able to work with environmental scientists from the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) and park staff to conduct water sampling activities at the Lake Ontario shoreline at Fort Niagara State Park. Students tested the water for chemicals, classified small organisms found in the area, and discussed weather conditions and land features that could affect our local watershed. The data we collected will be used as part of the Lake Ontario Lakewide Action and Management Plan Annual Report.

Students have also used their critical thinking and engineering skills to complete some fun STEM challenges. Before Halloween the students designed and created candy grabbers that mimicked how the bones and tendons in our hands function. Students also completed the Pumpkin Chunkin' Catapult Challenge. They designed and tested catapults to launch pumpkin candy corn. The winner sent his pumpkin over 9 meters!

















The theme for this year's Homecoming week was *Buffalo Sports Teams* and the 7th grade won the door decorating contest. During the kickball tournament, the 7th grade dismantled the 6th grade in the first game, but the 8th graders were crowned champions after the final game! The Pep Assembly featured some classic games including pie eating, the toilet paper race, and the basketball free throw competition. Students enjoyed participating in theme days on each day of the week. Special thanks to **Mrs. McCarthy** for all of her hard work coordinating the week-long activities.

7th GRADE FORT NIAGARA FIELD TRIP

On October 13th, the 7th grade class participated in the *Fall Frontier Days* at Old Fort Niagara. The goal of the program was to show students what it was like to live in the Niagara Region when the area was still a frontier. Students had the opportunity to discover the skills necessary to survive in a harsh environment. During the program, students rotated through a variety of learning stations, including the business of the French Fur Trade, daily life of a French soldier, and the artillery firing demonstration. The students also had the opportunity to see the United States Flag that flew over Fort Niagara the night the British overtook the fort.

After lunch, students took a ride up River Road and visited 5 Mile Meadows. This was the location the British Army used as a landing point when they invaded the United States from Canada during the War of 1812. Students were able to walk down to the Niagara River and observe the terrain and landscape.

It was a great experience and the kids enjoyed learning about some of the local history that took place in Niagara County!

The Kindness Store will be housed in Mrs. Harvey's room (room 23), and will be open once a week, during 12th period. A sign is posted outside room #23 that confirms the store hours, each week. 

SUSTAINED SILENT READING (SSR)





In an effort to increase student reading comprehension, build vocabulary and connect to writing, this year our 7th and 8th grade students are free reading in their various classes each week.

Joan Sedita of AdLit states, "The more students (of all ages) read, the more their reading skills improve and their vocabulary grows. We also know that motivation and self-directed learning is critical to promote reading by teenagers." Furthermore, "One way that motivation and engagement are instilled and maintained is to provide students with opportunities to select for themselves the materials they read and topics they research. One of the easiest ways to build some choice into the students' school day is to incorporate independent reading time in which they can read whatever they choose.

Each quarter, students will have an assignment tied to their reading of choice. While the assignment will change each quarter, it will offer accountability for their reading. We believe through fostering our students independent reading, they're sure to enhance their vocabulary, reading and writing skills.
