

8th GRADE HOLOCAUST UNIT

In preparation for learning about the Holocaust and reading The Diary of Anne Frank Play, our 8th grade students attended the play I Never Saw Another Butterfly at the Starry Night Theatre in North Tonawanda on Wednesday, March 22, 2023. The powerful one-act drama told the story of how children and their very special teacher kept hope alive during the horrors of the Holocaust by engaging in the arts and relying on each other. The show was based on a true story featuring poems and artwork inspired by authentic work created in the Terezin concentration camp. Over 15,000 Jewish children passed through Terezin, and only about a hundred were still alive when Terezin was liberated at the end of the war. After returning to school, students attended a presentation by Mr. Grigory Shershnevsky, a Holocaust survivor himself. Through the Holocaust Resource Center of Buffalo, Mr. Shershnevsky, born in Vilna, Lithuania, educates students all over Western New York of his own survival story from the Holocaust. In the end, his message to our students was to have "tolerance of others" and "do not be a bystander". If we could do this, then maybe history won't repeat itself. Mr. Shershnevsky has been welcomed here at Wilson for 5 years now and we look forward to seeing him next year to continue spreading his message.

As a follow-up activity, students in Mrs. Aloisio's English classes created paper butterflies, with messages of tolerance and encouragement written on the back. The butterflies were hung from the classroom ceiling.







CREATING PODCASTS IN SEVENTH GRADE

Students in Ms. Henzel's English classes spent a few weeks during the month of March writing and performing podcasts. (A podcast is a digital audio file that is made available via the internet.) The idea was inspired by a contest that is offered by NPR each year. 'The Student Podcast Challenge' is open to students in grades 5-12, where students are encouraged to narrate stories on any topics they find interesting. The overall theme for Ms. Henzel's students revolved around Greek mythology. The process began with a few days in the library, conducting research. Students then returned to the classroom to listen to sample podcasts and write their scripts. They worked in small groups and created shared drives in Google to store their collective work. Ms. Henzel gave individualized feedback to each group during the writing process, to help make sure their scripts were interesting and informative. She enlisted the help of Miss Mahar in the school library, for the technical parts of recording and editing. Miss Mahar taught herself an editing software named Audacity, and created video tutorials for the students to watch.

After their scripts were finished, students used the microphones on their Chromebooks to record their voices, using the website *Vocaroo*. The Technology Department created a shared drive that was accessible by all seventh graders, full of music and sound effects that Ms. Henzel and Miss Mahar curated. The last step of the process was to use *Audacity* to combine the voice recordings with other sounds. Audacity allowed students to make all kinds of adjustments and be very creative with their final product. As an added incentive, (local) prizes were offered for the top three podcasts. Congratulations to the following students, who were named 'Best in Show':
















SAND, SUN & FUN RUN



Hello From Your School Nurse

Hello Parents and Guardians

Welcome to Wilson Middle School, we are your nurses Mrs. Walch and Mrs. Barnum. We are here to help you have the best year possible. If it is medication at school that your child needs, a quick band-aid fix, or an ice pack we are here for you. We're also here to make sure the kids are healthy and safe and we can do that by making sure vaccines and physicals are up to date. Below is break down of what we need to help make the process easier.



Or did I?

What shots does my child need for school, and how can I make this process easier?

-There are specific years that specific shots are needed. The good news is that out of 7 years here only 3 years are the shot years. The bad news, this is one of those years, but it's not so bad because your child may have already had it!

Children entering 6th grade will need to have their Tdap(Tetanus) shot before starting 6th grade if they are already 11 yrs. old . If they are not 11, they will need it within 14 days of turning 11. The good news here is that Tdap can be administered from 10yrs and up, so it possible that your child got the vaccine at their 10yr appt. If you're not sure your doctor can let you know, or you can call us in the clinic to see if we have record of it.

If your child needs medication at school

-We are able to administer prescription and Over the Counter medications as long as we have a (1) doctors order for the medication,(2) your signature allowing us to give the medication, and (3)the medication in the original box that it came from the pharmacy in . We can then store the medication safely in the clinic and make sure that if your child needs it, it's here for them. ***Keep in mind that unfortunately we will need updated information every school year, as orders are specific to each school year***

In case of an emergency, we do have an office stock of Epi-Pens, and can administer them if needed based on an order from our school medical director

Yearly Physicals

-We do ask that you provide the clinic with a copy of your child's physical so we have record that they are healthy and cleared to participate in physical activities. The great thing about electronic medical records is that most offices can fax it right to us at 716-751-9597 and you don't have to do any running around. *Email is also a great option swalch@wilsoncsd.org or ebarnum@wilsoncsd.org

Injury notes

-We hope it doesn't happen but with active kids, comes injuries at times. If your child is injured and needs to be out of gym/sports or needs accommodations to be successful in school, we can make that happen for you. Please get us the doctors note via fax or by dropping it off and we'll take care of the rest.

Going home from the clinic

When your child is ill and needs to return home from school, you will need to pick them up from the middle school office. When you check in with the office, they will let us know and we will send them down.



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Children entering 7th grade will need to have their Meningitis shot before starting 7th grade, (we do have a 14-day grace period that state allows)

The good news here is that it may have been administered at your child's 11 year well visit., so it possible that your child got the vaccine already! If you're not sure your doctor can let you know, or you can call us in the clinic to see if we have record of it.

If your child needs medication at school

-We hope it doesn't happen but with active kids, comes injuries at times. If your child is injured and needs to be out of gym/sports or needs accommodations to be successful in school, we can make that happen for you. Please get us the doctors note via fax or by dropping it off and we'll take care of the rest.

Going home from the clinic

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That's right, by 8th grade your all set until 12th grade!

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-We do ask that you provide the clinic with a copy of your child physical so we have record that they are healthy and cleared to participate in physical activities.
